HIGHLIGHTS

CLIMATE AND ENVIRONMENT

Widespread flooding in February 2022 affected 22 municipalities, 2,581 people, and resulted in considerable damage to infrastructure. The situation is ongoing ([Reliefweb, 2022](#)).

Regarding post-earthquake recovery, an estimated \$2 billion USD is needed to assist the reconstruction and recovery of the area devastated by the 2021 earthquake ([News UN, 2022](#)).

MIGRATION AND DISPLACEMENT

There was an accelerated deportation of 4,000 Haitians on 36 “Title 42” flights from the USA to Haiti, as the “Title 42” order was due to expire on May 23, 2022 ([New York Times, 2022](#)).

HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE

WFP provided emergency assistance for 91,520 people (18,304 households), partnering with Haitian NGOs to distribute 24,000 meals twice daily.

The school feeding program fed an estimated 358,000 school children. WFP has standby partnerships with several INGOs, NGOs and CBOs to upscale operations ([WFP, 2022](#)).

FOOD SECURITY

Global price trends, due in part to the war in Ukraine, are pushing up fuel, transportation and food prices, including on staple food products. An ongoing, complex security situation and limited post-earthquake recovery have also increased food insecurity ([Reliefweb, 2022](#)).

SECURITY

The security situation in Haiti remains complex. Between April 24 and May 16, 2022, 188 people were killed in gang-related violence. Another 113 were injured, 12 are missing and 49 kidnapped for ransom. The major roads in/out of the capital are controlled by gangs ([News UN, 2022](#)).

HAITIAN RENEWAL ALLIANCE (HRA) AND IOM USA COLLABORATE AT HUMANITARIAN NETWORKS AND PARTNERSHIPS WEEK IN GENEVA, MAY 2022

During the Humanitarian Networks and Partnerships Week in Geneva, HRA and IOM USA shared a platform to discuss “Non-traditional actor engagement strategies for integration to increase communities’ resilience and reconstruction from disasters in the Caribbean.” The discussion centered around the role of the US-Haitian diaspora following the 2021 earthquake and the lessons learned, in an effort to improve coordination among humanitarian actors ([UNOCHA, 2022](#)).
